MILLENNIUM MEMO

Every so often I like to look at the trend of home sales in our Communities. Strong home values are perhaps the most effective indication of what the "marketplace" thinks of the lifestyle offered by our Park. Admit it: you're also kind of curious about that, aren't you?

Here's what I found:

- In the 6 months ending August 31 (the last date for which I have stats), there were a total of 20 home sales in The Tropics. The highest sales price was \$259K. 2 others sold for \$249,900 and 1 for \$250K. In all, 7 homes sold for \$200K+, each sold by a dealer. Older homes went for much less.
- The lowest sale price was \$18,500, which must have been an outlier, as only 2 of the 20 sales were for less than \$105K.
- The average of the 20 sale prices was \$156,890--\$140,333 if you just count the used homes.

Interesting numbers, aren't they? The intrinsic value of older homes is obviously far less than \$140K. They only sell for that much because they come with the right to live in The Tropics. They'd be worth only a fraction of that amount if they were on a dealer's lot someplace.

Thank you for your part in making The Tropics such a desirable and welcoming place to live. You have helped make your home more valuable than ever.

More Good News...

- Your Rent Dollars at Work: Since they seem to be marginally effective, we added 3 speed signs, at a cost of \$3K each. Next project: resurfacing the Hot Tub, at a projected cost of \$13,733.
- This month's Resident Kudo goes to Gracia Mangrobang (Sp. 447). Gracia gets up at 4 AM each morning & goes to Krispy Crème to bring donuts to the Park. Can you imagine anything more valuable to Park residents? Thanks so much, Gracia!
- Let's give a Staff Kudo to Louise, for the great job she does cleaning the Clubhouse. It's a dirty job but someone has to do it. Perhaps you can thank Louise next time you see her.





EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS



During the year amateur radio operators meet at various locations to share information. These special events are held throughout the world. Safety and assuring our survival is the most important items discussed at these sessions. We all live in a mode of relative comfort believing that when needed, the cell phone is able to bring immediate help. This gives most people the false sense of security that 911 will bring first responders to their door step in ten minutes. That isn't what is happening in the rest of the country. As you know California is the most populated state in the union. When the long anticipated earthquakes happen, chaos, confusion, and the total collapse of our emergency system will be inevitable.

In Union City we have nearly 75 thousand people and only 5 police officers on duty at a time. Conveniences are wonderful to have until they are suddenly not there. Back-up systems are the only way we can be

moved to the top of the priority list. The largest modern passenger airliners have back-up systems to immediately take over when normal operating systems fail. There is no time to fix a failed part while traveling 500 miles per hour at 50,000 feet with a plane full of passengers.

Medical science has discovered many years ago that regular preventative health care has great rewards; it gives us a better quality of life.

While monitoring the emergency frequencies, I hear of residents trapped in their homes, hanging on to tree limbs, squeezing into their attics, floating on rushing rivers in cars as flood levels rise above window sills, wandering aimlessly following ravaging tornados and hurricanes.

The west coast has been known to have fewer disasters than other states where extreme weather conditions occur multiple times per year. Our unique pending sleeping giant disasters are fires and earthquakes. Yes we are responsible for ourselves and now is the time to be prepared for the unforeseen emergencies that take so many communities by surprise.

Tina and I have been attending the special events with other amateur radio operators on a consistent basis. The Tropics Mobile Home Park is well known and represented among



thousands of emergency stations everywhere. We were privileged to be awarded certificates of achievements for our outstanding participation with the California Rescue Communications.

Stay safe, be prepared and remember "ask not what your community can do for you; ask what you can do to assist your community"
