

One park resident has been here for a little over16 years, yet is known by just about no one. His name is Joseph Harrison.



Tri-City Taxi Voucher Program



(Program Guidelines effective: July 2016)

Subsidized taxi rides for eligible Fremont, Newark and Union City Residents

This program is operated by the City of Fremont and funded by the Alameda County Transportation Commission through Measure B/BB. For more information on Measure B/BB, visit: www.alamedactc.org

The Tri-City Taxi Voucher Program provides subsidized taxi rides to help seniors and people with disabilities with same-day transportation needs.

Service is provided within Fremont, Newark and Union City only and is not wheelchair accessible at this time.

In order to be eligible for the Tri-City Taxi Voucher Program, you must be a Fremont, Newark or Union City resident, AND:

- 1. Be at least 80 years of age OR
- 2. Be unable to use public transit because of a disability.

Program participants are able to purchase a maximum of 20 taxi vouchers per month. The Taxi Voucher Program is subject to change or termination at any time based on the availability of project funding.

Vouchers cost \$4 each and each voucher subsidizes up to \$16 of taxi meter fare.

Only 1 Voucher can be used per one-way trip. Riders are responsible for paying any fare beyond the \$16 voucher subsidy and for tipping the driver.

Vouchers are only valid with the designated taxi cabs contracted to provide the service. Subsidized taxi service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

If you are interested in applying for the Tri-City Taxi Voucher Program, please complete and mail the attached Program Application Form. Individuals who are deemed eligible for the program will be mailed the Taxi Voucher Program Rider's Guide and four (4) free taxi vouchers along with information on how to order more taxi vouchers.
