You would think it would be illegal, but there are apps you can get for your phone to make your telephone number appear as another number on caller ID. Using these apps is called spoofing and is only illegal "if used with intent to defraud, cause harm, or wrongly obtain anything of value." Today a woman came to the police station and reported that she received a call from a number that showed up on her caller ID as "UCPD" with the police department's nonemergency number. The caller told the woman she needed to clear up a \$1000 warrant over some debt she never paid. The woman provided a debit card number to the caller and was told her debit card was not working. She was then instructed to purchase \$1000 in iTunes gift cards and was provided an 800 number to give the iTunes gift card numbers to an operator, which the woman did. After realizing she had been duped, the woman contacted Apple and is trying to get refunded. The 800 number was also a fake number and now is not operational. Most often there are no investigative leads in these type of crimes so the likelihood of getting money back is unfortunately slim to none.

Please remember that no government agency is going to try and collect money from you over the phone. Never provide credit or debit card information over the phone or via email to someone claiming to be the IRS, the police, the city, or the courts. Also, absolutely no government agency will accept iTunes gift cards as a form of payment.

Remember that not all these scammers use spoofed numbers. I always advise people to not answer the phone if they don't recognize a caller ID number. If it's important (and legit), the caller will usually leave a voice message.






