MILLENNIUM MEMO

A couple months ago I reported that The Tropics might save \$300-\$400K per year by refinancing its bonds. It seemed almost too good to be true: a reinvest an additional \$400K/year of your rent dollars back into the Park! We've hit a snag, however, so now we're not sure we should proceed

The issue involves the Housing Assistance Program, specifically the City's requirement that 50% of all Park surpluses be deposited into the Housing Assistance Fund. By the end of 2016, there will be around \$1,600,000 in that Fund.

Currently 145 Tropics households—27% of the Park--receive an average of \$160/ month in housing assistance, at a cost of \$278K per year. As you can see, the Program is VERY well funded, with almost 6 years' worth of subsidy already on hand.

If we do the refinancing, The Tropics' annual surpluses would grow to nearly \$1M per year. That would mean that under our current Agreement with the City we'd have to deposit \$500K per year (1/2 of the new Surplus) into a Fund that already has \$1.6M. The Housing Assistance Fund would keep growing faster than we can spend it.

Our idea is to find some sort of balance between the Housing Assistance Program and the need to set money aside for The Tropics' future infrastructure needs. We've done the streets & electrical system, but what about the 40-year-old water, gas, sewer & storm drains? Can you imagine how many millions that will cost?

City Staff is supportive of a refinance—who wouldn't be?—but they insist that The Tropics stick with the current arrangement, including a wildly-overfunded Subsidy Program. This leaves us at a polite impasse. For now, we've reluctantly decided to put off the refinancing, even though that will cost The Tropics \$400K/year, and hope that the City will revisit this issue at some later date.

Naturally, I'd welcome the Resident Club Board's input and advice on this, but for the moment, the refinance is on hold.

In Other News...

JB Bostick will be sealing the streets on




the north side that were recently paved on August 8 through 11. We will soon have a site map with specific dates for your home site in order for you to plan accordingly.


Bill has two brothers and one sister. Bill's early years were spent growing up in San Leandro. He remembers the days when you didn't have to go to the store to find cherries. Cherry orchards were growing everywhere in San Leandro. He attended McKinley Grammar school with his siblings. He still blames his older brother Dick for always getting him in trouble. As kids, they loved to play baseball. They couldn't play far enough away from the house to keep from sending baseballs crashing through the window.

In high school. Bill dressed up as a pirate and played the French horn in the band. He spent summers working at the old Hunt's cannery unloading bags of sugar from the boxcars on the train. Then when World War 2 came along, Bill enlisted with his high school buddies. He trained as a bombardier in the Air Corps, flying in B-24's.

His family owned and operated several motels in the area: the Bay View and the Motel Charlo. Bill helped with the construction of the Charlo Motel on Foothill Blvd. The name of the motel was a combination of his parent's names: Charles and Lois. It was one of the first motels to have a TV in each room. Bill owned and managed apartments in Santa Cruz for a few years, but now considers himself retired.

Bill enjoyed many fishing trips with the guys for salmon and steelhead on the Klamath River and Eagle Lake Trout at Eagle Lake. His prize catch was a 5-1/2 pound trout that he has mounted on his wall. Summers would often find Bill driving up the Oregon Coast in his RV. He often traveled with the Good Sam Club and enjoyed their trips to Canada and the Calgary Stampede. At one time he was an active member of ARRP and went on many trips with them. He had a great time when they toured Europe for 30 days. He enjoys bus trips from the park and has gone on many cruises. Besides loving to travel. Bill also enjoys sports He loves to watch the sports channel too. He used to have fun when the park had cribbage, pool and horseshoe tournaments. On special occasions at the park, you will usually find Bill used to be the one in the kitchen mixing up scrambled eggs or pancake batter or making orange juice. He always shows up to help set up or clean up afterward. Bill is always willing to lend a hand and looks out for his neighbors. They all sing his praises. I agree. But then I'm a bit prejudice because I've known what a great guy he is all my life. I am lucky to have him as my uncle.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS



We have had another very dry year so far. The news channels show all the destruction caused by monumental fires here in our own home state. One of our amateur radio friends who lives in Lake Isabella announced that his home was near a major fire. He sent photos of flames hundreds of feet high just outside of his balcony. The forest service came to evacuate all the residents in the area. The last we heard from him is that he was waiting for a transport out of the region to a safe place.

Cell service wasn't working because of melted cell towers. While he was still at his location; desperate neighbors were asking for him to send messages to their family members. Scott remained relaying vital information for these neighbors. We haven't heard from him since. All attempts to locate him have been unsuccessful. We have been friends for many years and he's just the man who would stand his post to the last breath using his ham radio to help others.

The ham radio doesn't require house hold electricity and can be independent of our grid. There are no connections to phone systems. It is ca-

pable of sending out a signal powerful enough to circumvent the entire world. Tina has even communicated to the space station form our house. When all other forms of communications fail the amateur radio operators will still be heard.


